#### A. Personal Statement

I am a public health psychologist and chair of the Department of Health Behavior, Society, and Policy at the Rutgers School of Public Health. Prior to joining Rutgers, I worked at the University of Rochester School of Medicine and Dentistry (1993-2018), where I held appointments in the Departments of Psychiatry (primary), Medicine, and Family Medicine. At Rochester, I served as Director of Research in the Department of Medicine's Division of Palliative Care.

For the past fifteen+ years, my colleagues and I have conducted research that aims to improve end-of-life (EoL) outcomes among seriously ill patients and their family caregivers by enhancing the quality of communication and medical decision-making at the point-of-care. This application, which aims to explore community-based oncologists' attitudes and beliefs about offering prognostic information, and then create a tool to facilitate prognostic communication, is consistent with my broader program of research in EoL care. I will contribute expertise in the conceptualization and measurement of both prognostic understanding and patient-clinician communication about prognosis.

2. Experience conducting rigorous foundational research supporting the need for innovative communication interventions in the care of seriously ill patients.

Many patients do not have a good understanding of their prognosis (**a-c**). They make high-stakes medical decisions that they come to regret based on mistaken beliefs about the efficacy of treatments and their belief that doctors and family members want them to choose particular treatments (**d**). These findings support the foundational assumptions underlying the proposed study.
