A. Personal Statement

I am a practicing board-certified family physician of over 30 years and health services researcher with expertise in cancer control, cancer survivorship, obesity, health disparities, and primary care research. I am the Director of the New Jersey Primary Care Research Network (NJPCRN), an Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality (AHRQ)-recognized Practice-Based Research Network (PBRN), which includes over 300 primary care physicians caring for more than 750,000 patients across approximately 114 primary care practices in New Jersey. I have expertise in both quantitative, qualitative, and mixed methods research, from secondary data analysis of large databases, to chart review studies, surveys, field observations, focus groups, interviews, internet forums, and randomized controlled trials, having participated as PI or co-investigator of grants totaling over \$32.4 million in extramural support, including grants in which I provided qualitative and mixed methods expertise (e.g., R01CA11287, R01CA176545, R01CA176838, 3UL1TR003017-02S2, R01CA257197). I have national recognition in cancer-related population science research, serving as member of several NCI special emphasis panels including: Multilevel Interventions in Cancer Care Delivery; Population-based Research and Coordinating Center for Population-based Research to Optimize the Screening Process; Accelerating Colorectal Cancer Screening and Follow-up: The Moonshot Initiative; as well as ad-hoc member of NIH's Dissemination and Implementation Research in Health; and Lifestyle Change and Behavioral Health study sections. I also serve as a member of the Editorial Boards for the Journal of the American Board of Family Medicine, and Family Medicine and Community Health. I recently participated in a study aimed at increasing COVID-19 testing among minority populations (NJ HEROES TOO), which enrolled over 2000 participants. I served as the Scientific Director of Qualitative Research for the Cancer Prevention and Outcome Data Support Shared Resource (CPODS SR) before becoming the Co-Director in May 2022. As such, I lead the qualitative research activities for CPODS SR, including meeting with investigators and staff to ensure that qualitative studies are scientifically rigorous and project goals are met. I also work closely with Dr. Bandera to coordinate and supervise all activities of the CPODS SR, including personnel and budgetary decisions.
