Course Description:

This clinical theory course focuses on the care of women with common gynecological problems throughout the lifespan as well as family centered care from preconception through childbearing and the postpartum. Emphasis will be placed on wellness and health promotion of women associated with the normal processes of aging and childbearing. In addition, complications of the puerperum period will be identified and interventions described. Current national and global issues in caring for women and infants will be explored. The integration of genetics and evidence into practice as well as caring for diverse populations will be presented.

- Apply WHO, AACN, AWHONN, AAP, CDC and ACOG Standards to clinical practice (II, III)
- Explore how research is integrated into evidence-based practice when delivering care to women and infants (III)
- Identify quality and safety issues in maternal/newborn clinical practice (II)
- Identify the nurse's role in health promotion, disease prevention, and advocating for women across the lifespan in global environments and inner-city communities such as Camden, N.J.* (V, VI, VII, IX)

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- Understand the physiology of reproduction and childbearing including genetics and infertility in addition to complications associated with the antepartum, intrapartum and postpartum periods. (VII, IX)
- Discuss the issues facing women later in life including menopause, reproductive cancers and heart disease (VII, IX)
- Develop skills of effective communication, teaching and collaboration with clients and healthcare team members (VI)
- Discuss the implications of healthcare policy on issues related to access to care, use of publically funded programs for pregnant women, WIC Program, and social justice in healthcare delivery (IV, V, VIII)
- Examine the concept of civic engagement and how it applies to the role of the professional nurse working in Camden, N.J. (VI, VII, VIII, IX)

Methods of Instruction:

This class will be taught using multiple formats including asynchronous recorded classroom lecture, synchronous web-based course meetings with discussion, audiovisual media, web-based simulation, case studies, class reflection exercises, educational gaming, and required readings.

- 1. The student needs to obtain a note from their healthcare provider that includes the dates of their illness/hospitalization and the date that they are cleared to return to school

Course Requirements:

1) Attendance:

- a) Students are required to attend all scheduled synchronous classes. Students are expected to be on time, and to stay for the entire class. Refer to the student handbook for the attendance protocol. Students are to notify the Professor and course assistant via email prior to missing any class and reason for the absence. If class is missed, the student is responsible for missed content.
- b) The above attendance policy also applies to exam days and recitation sessions

d) Recitations are scheduled on Mondays 3:45 – 4:45pm

- i) The Course Assistant will lead recitation each week
- ii) Recitation sessions are mandatory
- iii) The purpose of recitation is to review topics that may need further clarification; however, the Course Assistant should not be expected to re-teach topics that have already been covered in class and in the readings. For example, a student should not come to recitation asking the Course Assistant "What is gestational hypertension?" and expect the Course Assistant to reteach this topic. Instead, the student should first read about this topic in their textbook, review their lecture notes, and review other resources posted on Canvas. After doing their due diligence of reviewing the topic, the student can then ask a more specific question related to the topic for further clarification
- iv) The Course Assistant may use recitation time to hold an exam review and/or review topics after an exam
- 2) Lateness: The Professor and Course Assistant should be notified in advance if the student will be late to class and/or recitation

3) Assignments and Readings:

- a) Assigned readings are to be completed prior to the scheduled lecture. The professor reserves the right to add additional readings during the semester.
- b) All assignments are due on the dates and times provided on this syllabus and Canvas.
 - i) If an assignment is not turned in on time, the student will earn a 0 (zero) grade for the assignment
 - ii) If students require more time for an assignment, the student must notify the professor in a timely manner **prior to due date**. Granting the request is at the discretion of the professor.
- 4) **Evaluation and Testing:** All tests/exams will utilize Exam soft, a computer-based platform. Therefore, **ALL** students <u>must</u> have access to a laptop for all tests administered in this class.  - a) All students are expected to take exams on the scheduled date and time
 - b) If a student finds it necessary to miss an exam based on illness or unforeseen circumstances, he/she must notify the Professor, Course Assistant, and the Dean of Students Office **prior to** the exam.

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- i) If the Professor, Course Assistant, and the Dean of Students Office are not contacted by the student, the student will earn a grade of 0 (zero) for the missed exam.
- ii) If the Professor and Course Assistant are contacted and a letter from their healthcare provider is provided to the Dean of Students Office, a make-up exam will be created, and a make-up exam date will be provided to the student. **The format for a make-up exam may vary**
- c) Students will be allowed to review the questions answered incorrectly the next week after an exam or as outlined by the Professor. After that time frame, students will not be allowed to review their exams
- d) Post-exam review may be done individually or in a group. The Professor and Course Assistant reserves the right to choose how post-exam review will be facilitated

5) Quizzes

- a) Weekly quizzes will be administered based on the topical content assigned as per the class schedule
- b) If a student misses a quiz, they will earn a grade of 0 (zero); there will be no opportunity to make up the quiz
- c) Quizzes can only be taken during a specific time in class. The student must be present in class to take the quiz
- d) The two lowest quiz grades will be dropped
- 6) Course Progression:
 - a) A grade of C+ or above is required for progression
 - b) A satisfactory grade in the clinical component course (705:302) is required for progression
 - c) If a student earns a grade of less than C+ in the course (705:301), he/she will receive "no credit" for the clinical component course (705:302) regardless of their performance in the clinical setting.
 - d) Likewise, if a student earns an unsatisfactory grade in the clinical course (705:302), he/she will receive "no credit" for the course (705:301) regardless of their performance in the classroom setting.
 - e) If a student earns a grade of less than a C+ in either 705:301 or 302, the student will have to **retake both courses** simultaneously.
- 7) Class and Individual Communication from Faculty: Students enrolled in this course are expected to check their Rutgers email accounts and log on to the Canvas online course every 24-48 hours to check for updates, announcements, and to access course materials.
 - a) Most of the communication for the class will be facilitated through Canvas announcements 1-2 times per week; make sure to have the notifications for announcements on for this class.
 - b) Individual communication to students will be through Rutgers email/Canvas message
 - c) The professor and/or course assistant may provide additional feedback by email.
 - d) The course faculty may also request a virtual meeting with the student to further discuss their assignment, provide assistance, classroom participation, conduct in class, absences
