What do you like best about this course?:

"the professor was extremely knowledgeable "

"Professor Syrett was a great professor and she was always ready for the class. I loved the course in general, and I liked how Professor Syrett would thoroughly talk about the articles that we had to read before class. It made it easier to understand if you were confused while reading."

"I loved how we had the forum postings - usually in my classes, it is sometimes a bit of an annoyance to be very honest, because it becomes something you have to do for a grade. Yet with these posts, it really helped (I feel at least) to clarify lectures, because we could put up any questions we had, see how others interpreted the lectures, and it really created that type of environment where we helped each other. If you were teaching this course, what would you do differently?:

"more class discussion/conversation"

"I don't think I would do anything differently in this course! I think Professor Syrett did a great job in teaching this class!"

"Spend a little more time on the experiments portion of the course - this was my favorite part because it really helped tie in all the definitions and theories to real-life application. Sometimes doing all the readings, I was super confused coming in and I really didn't feel like I took much away from them because they were so dense. The experiments really helped me understand the lectures better"

"I'm really not sure how you can make this class more perfect. Maybe a little project at the middle of the semester in the form of a forum posting would have been fun? I enjoyed the meme-posting assignment very much."

"Try to emphasize / separate the difference between a lot of general terms, because many of them have similarities that can be difficult to decipher. Maybe provide a study guide for exams."

"Potentially provide my own examples of pragmatics in play in media at the beginning of class to get the students excited about the course. Maybe focus in more on Donald Trump's tweets"

"Please don't scare us about the exams, saying they'll be awfully difficult, if they won't be. I can understand wanting us to study, but scare tactics don't work that way - you'll just make the students who would have studied frightened and stressed, so they'll study even more, and you won't affect the students who wouldn't have studied to begin with. I don't need that - I'm anxious enough to begin with, and getting me frightened and then giving a relatively simple exam doesn't make me feel better for having studied, it makes me feel conned and leaves me with high blood pressure and a feeling that I've been patronized, which I get enough of from other sources, I don't need it from my teachers."

"Maybe slightly shorter readings, but the students will survive."

"I would add either more assessments or maybe take-home assignments and homework to have more chances to raise grades."
