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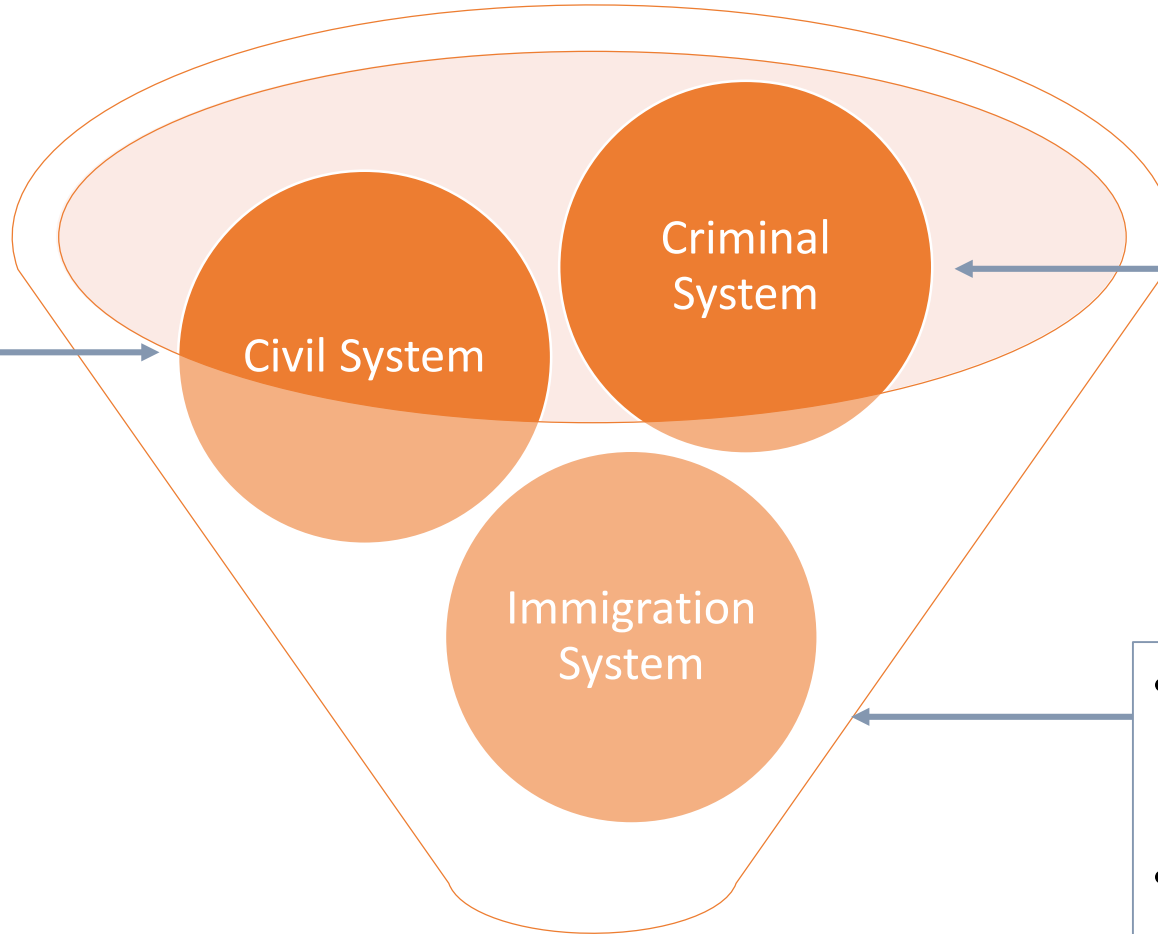
Opioid Use and Legal Involvement

- Individuals with opioid use disorder have **high levels of criminal legal involvement**, with **likelihood of recent legal involvement increasing** among people with severe opioid use disorders (Winkelman et al., 2018)
- **More than half** of state inmates and **two-thirds** of jail inmates met criteria for a substance use disorder according to the 2007-2009 National Inmate Survey (Bronson et al., 2020)
- As of October 2021, **nearly 27,000** people have enrolled in **New Jersey's drug court program** (New Jersey Administrative Office of the Courts, 2021)
- In Newark Community Solutions, a low level diversion program, approximately **two-thirds of participants endorse problems with substance use**

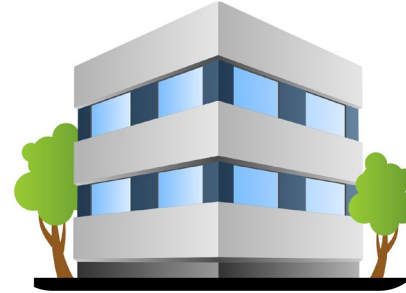

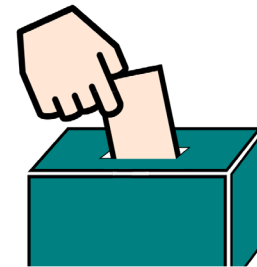

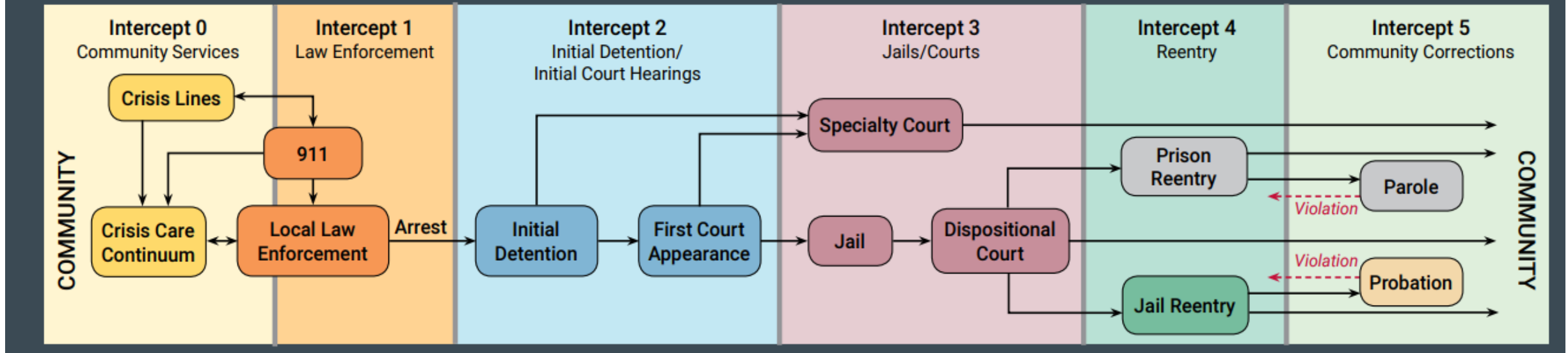

SAMHSA's Sequential Intercept Model

The Sequential Intercept Model



Prevention programs in the community can **prevent people from coming in contact with the justice system.**

Police Led Diversion programs provide intervention **before sending a case to court.**

Pretrial Diversion Programs provide intervention at first court appearance **before a plea is entered.**

Specialty courts like drug courts allow people to go to **treatment instead of prison.** There are also **treatment programs offered in jails.**

Discharge planning and reentry programs help people **maintain treatment upon release** from prison or jail.

Treatment programs in probation and parole, including **specialty caseloads** and **relapse prevention programs,** provide support for people with SUDs and can provide **alternatives to violations.**

When did you last reach out?</p>	<p>Assess the immediate needs to identify potential barriers to future treatment adherence.</p> <p>“I don't knows” and “I'm not sures” could mean that the individual is in violation of their obligations and may require further follow up.</p>
